George Kendall Jr, (6) of the town of *Cartel*, in the County of *Clinton*, and State of *Illinois*, formerly a Soldier of the United States of America, in the war against (1) *Rebellion*, respectfully asks that he be admitted as a member of said Home.

To enable the authorities to determine whether or not he is legally entitled to become a member of said Home, he declares and states the facts to be that he is now *61* years old; that he is *5* feet and *9* inches high; that he is of *Light* complexion, *Blue* eyes, and *Gray* hair; that he was born in the town of *Moughford* of *England*, on the *9th* day of *February*, 18*43*; that he has been (2) *2* enrolled in the U. S. A. service; in the war against *Rebellion*, and in the war of the late Rebellion; and that he has been (3) *2* honorably discharged from the service of the United States. That the following is a true statement of the time and place of his enrollment and discharge from said service, and that the cause of his discharge, and of his rank at the respective date thereof namely:

That he now receives, on pension certificate number *108759*, a pension of *8* dollars a month, payable the *1st* day of next *August*, at the *Quincy* Pension Office.

That he owns property, real and personal, of the value of *None* dollars and no more; that he has no means of self-support other than the above named; that his trade or occupation is that of a *Farmer*

That he has (4) *None* wife; that he has *5* children now living; ages, respectively, (5) *37-33-29-14* years. That his postoffice address is _____, State of Illinois; that his nearest railway station is _____, on the _____ Railway, in _____ County, in said State; that the name and address of the person to whom he desires notice of his illness or death shall be given, is *Charles Kendall* of *Holland*, County of *Scott*, State of *Missouri*; that, in case of his death, he desires all his personal effects to be sent to *Miss Emma Kendall*, at *Quincy*, County of *Missouri*, State of *Missouri*.

That he has not heretofore been a member of any Soldiers', Sailors', or other Charitable Home or Institution, excepting the (6) *None*

That he is now a bona fide resident of the State of Illinois, and has continuously lived and resided in said State for the last two years, or has served in an Illinois organization.

That he is so far disabled by (7) *Loss of limb, Rheumatism & other Debility*

as to now be incapable of earning his own living.

That he has at all times, heretofore, supported and adhered to the government of the United States of America, and that he has not at any time been engaged in, or countenanced, or aided, or abetted, the cause of the late Rebellion.

That if he shall be admitted to be a member of the said Home, he will, in all things and in every respect, comply with and conform to the rules and regulations made, or that shall hereafter be made, for the government and discipline of the same; and that he will cheerfully do and perform any and all things that shall be required of him by those there in authority over him; and that he will promptly, and willingly, obey all lawful orders that he shall receive from any officer of the Home, so long as he shall remain a member thereof.

Dear Mrs. Gardner:

In reply to your letter of April 29th, Mr. Kendall was admitted to our Home from Carlisle, Clinton County, Illinois on July 15, 1904. He was in and out of the Home at various times, his last readmission was on November 18, 1924 and died in our hospital January 4, 1926 and was buried in our Home cemetery.

He was born in Brightford, England on February 9, 1843. The application indicated that he had no wife and that he had five children but only four names were listed as follows: Charles Kendall, Holland, Mo.
Lewis Kendall, Bear Creek, Ill.
Mary A. -----, Alton, Ill.
Emma Kendall, Anniston, Mo.

Mr. Kendall enlisted August 28, 1861 at Carlisle, Illinois and was discharged June 29, 1865 at Louisville, Kentucky. He served as a Pvt. Co. K. 30th Illinois Infantry.

We trust that this is the individual on whom you wish information since records kept at the time he was a member of our Home were quite scant.

Would it be possible for
you to furnish information,
for genealogical purposes,
on a Civil War Veteran,
who lived in the Soldiers
Home around 1912 to 1914?

I have been unable to
obtain information from
State or Federal records
because of scanty
information in my
possession.

The veteran was George Kendall. His second wife, -1883-1886,- was Delilah Ann (Miles-Morris) Kendall. He had a son, Ed. (not certain whether Edward or Edwin) born in 1884. In 1914 the son lived near Kenimundy, Illinois.

In 1882 he lived in Clinton County, Illinois, probably near Boulder, and probably lived there until at least 1886.

Inasmuch as this area is adjacent to Bond, Fayette and Marion Counties there is a possibility he

may have lived in
any one of these countries
just before entering
The Soldiers Home.

He was a prisoner in
Andersonville Prison during
the Civil War. Another
relative enlisted from
Boulder Illinois, & who was
in Andersonville also, was
in Co. D- 111th Ill. Infantry, so
perhaps Mr. Kendall might
have been with that Co.,
since they were both in
the same area at the
same time. (Just presumption
on my part).

There was a letter received from Mr. Kendall in about 1914. It had been mailed at Coatsburg, Illinois. I do not know whether he was visiting someone in that town, or had left the home for a while.

I'm sorry I can't furnish any more information on this veteran but it is important that I do learn what I can about him.

Mr. Kendall's son, Ed, was in the Orphan's Home, Normal Ill., 1895-1911.

My informant pronounced his name "Kennal" but on one document, unrelated to military ~~service~~, service, it was spelled "Kendall," so I'm sure that is the name. I know of no middle initial.

Thanks for any help you can give. I imagine this man was in the home for some time long before the 1913 or 1914 date.

The act of July 4, 1884, provides that the fee for the prosecution of a pension claim shall be \$10 only, unless a larger fee, not exceeding \$25, is agreed upon under a special written contract. The fee will be paid to the attorney, or other person entitled thereto, out of the pension allowed. Should the attorney or other person demand or receive for his services any greater compensation, he would subject himself to the penalties provided in the statute, as follows:

Any agent or attorney or other person instrumental in prosecuting any claim for pension or bounty land who shall directly or indirectly contract for, demand, or receive or retain any greater compensation for his services or instrumentality in prosecuting a claim for pension or bounty land than is herein provided, or for payment thereof at any other time or in any other manner than is herein provided, or who shall wrongfully withhold from a pensioner or claimant the whole or any part of the pension or claim allowed and due such pensioner or claimant, or the land warrant issued to any such claimant, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall, for every such offense, be fined not exceeding \$500, or imprisoned at hard labor not exceeding two years, or both, in the discretion of the court.
